Course description

This course covers methodology and research design in international relations. Starting with the general issues of theoretical development and causation, we then focus closely on the issues of conducting research: selecting a research question, generating propositions and hypotheses, developing concepts and their measures, selecting cases and units of analysis for the empirical analysis, and getting familiar with a few major data sets. Toward the end of the course, we will overview the basic issues in the "qualitative vs. quantitative methods" debate as well as statistical estimator choices. Previous coursework in research methods is strongly recommended.

Course requirements

- 20% Research Review
- 15% seminar moderator for one topic
- 10% regular seminar participation
